Conservation and Nutrient Loss Reduction with Steve Stierwalt

Steve Stierwalt is a farmer in the Sadorus/Ivesdale area of Champaign County. Stierwalt is the Vice President on the State SWCD (Soil and Water Conservation District) Board. He currently serves as the Chairman of the Champaign County Soil and Water Conservation District Board. Stierwalt is involved with the Earth Partners and their Ag literacy effort and is also a past President on the Champaign County Farm Bureau Board. Stierwalt says "the Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy is going to be one the most significant developments that are actually happening in agriculture on the conservation side".

The problem, or call-to-action, has been the response to the Gulf Hypoxia. Due to this environmental issue, farmers in the country (especially the Mid-West) have been asked to come up with strategies to reduce nutrient loss. "Ivan Dozier is to thank for getting the word "Loss" in our strategy title." The issue is not over application, says Stierwalt, it is losing the nutrients applied. Stierwalt said that we need to make progress over the next five years to "move the needle" and achieve the goals we have set, before these voluntary actions become mandatory regulations. "It is important to be able to make these changes on our own farms", said Stierwalt. SWCD, Champaign County Farm Bureau, Illinois Corn Growers, University of Illinois and CCFB's Land Use Committee make up the Nutrient

Loss Reduction Task Force.

Some practices can be implemented without drastic changes. Not applying phosphorus on frozen ground, adding a stabilizer, spring field testing and strip tillage. Farmers need to have a plan before the end of harvest - nutrient management plans are not costly practices, but take time to establish. The FSA county committee is open to helping the task force develop a survey to capture the data on current practices: split-nitrogen, cover crops etc (with no

identifiers to farmers). The recent Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy plan has been released. Stierwalt gave some words on the strategy plan and mentioned that we can always do better, it will take a long time to get there and we are a long way from it, but we can always do better to achieve this goal. Rural Route Safety

With Captain Shane Cook

Captain Shane Cook, Champaign County Sheriff's Department, was able to provide some tips and suggestions with rural route safety and "corn corners" during this growing season and the upcoming harvest. Blind corners, or "corn corners' as you may have heard them called, have always been a dangerous factor on the rural roads.

These corners are any intersection where there is corn on either side of the road, preventing you to see oncoming traffic. Cook says when approaching these corners be sure to come to a complete stop, where there is a stop sign, and yield cautiously if there is not a sign present. Most accidents happen because of the failure of stopping the vehicle and scanning the surroundings before proceeding. Cook mentioned that some farmers are helping the situation by cutting the corners off their fields at these dangerous intersections. As we approach harvest, it is important to remember that we need to share the

road, not only as farmers operating machinery, but as motorists too. A great tip offered by Cook to farmers would be instead of letting a motorist decide when the right time to pass equipment would be, try to offer hand signals to motion to a following motorist that is safe/clear for them to pass.. A tip to motorists, stay on roads that you are familiar with and do not use country roads as shortcuts. Do NOT shut off lights at blind corners

- slow down and yield cautiously.

When asked about rural crime, Captain Cook said to pay close attention to details, unfamiliar faces or vehicles that may be in the area. Cook also pointed out to lock your house, car, shed and fuel pumps. Anhydrous tanks, scrap metal and copper are hot items for a thief to steal these days. "If they got away with it once, they will mostly likely try to succeed again at the same place." Said Cook *Stay Safe*

CCFB President's Report Eric Suits

August 5, 2015

2015 will probably become the year of the extremes. After 5 weeks of immense moisture over the entire county limiting the opportunity for replant of drowned out areas, making spray applications, or even getting opportunity to

harvest wheat, the rain valve has started to shut off and we now have many areas that are starting to suffer from too little rain. Corn in many areas is tipping back from initial pollination potential we saw in early July and some bean fields are struggling to close rows as growing conditions change. It will be extremely interesting to see what we experience in yield levels this fall after the roller coaster of planting and growing conditions that this crop has had to experience.

July presented the opportunity for me to represent the county at IFB President's conference in Bloomington towards the end of the month. 

Stierwalt has introduced some of these nutrient loss reduction practices on his own farms. Some practices he has been utilizing have been: No fall anhydrous before the ground is below 50 degrees, using a stabilizer in the fall, corn is planted with striptill with displacement of phosphorus (so it isn't place on top of the ground) corn is done with split application, less than half of nitrogen is applied in the fall. Stierwalt mentioned he has tried some covers crops on 90 acres to gain experience and he does not apply on frozen ground. There is an initial cost of the strip-till tool bar, but the return is higher than the cost, said Stierwalt. Stierwalt has adopted these changes for the past 10 years. "Don't ever expect to be done, we can always do things better", said Stierwalt. Stierwalt is proud that Champaign County has multiple resources to succeed with a plan. In Stierwalt's opinion, the best way to complete this process is locally, and Champaign has the right "tools" to do it.

"We all look at our farms and do a good job, but we have to raise the bar to that next notch – Farmers do a good job".


The evening had an overview of grain bin safety, lock out/tag out and a simulation of the life line.

Try this Recipe at Home!

Zucchini and Squash Tacos Ingredients:

1 large onion, peeled, quartered and sliced thin

- 2 zucchini, sliced thin
- 2 summer squash sliced thin
- 1 15oz can of black beans rinsed 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 4 Tb. butter 1 Tb fajita seasoning
- 2 tsp. cumin
- 1/4 chipotle chili powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cups Mexican Cheese
- 1 package corn tortillas







The second day of camp was all about apples, soil, wheat and horticulture. One of the best ways to get kids thinking about agriculture is to relate it to food and that's just what we did! Campers learned about how apples grow, the importance of pollination by bees and then made 'Apple





Campers visited Sola Gratia, a four acre local produce farm, during their week of Ag Camp. At Sola Gratia the youth rotated between stations learning how to create healthy snack**, bees and the importance of pollinators, MyPlate food guidelines and also got to walk out amongst the vegetables and see them growing!

Directions

1. Chop the veggies and leave in sepa-rate piles. Mix the salt and spices in a small bowl and sprinkle evenly over all the veggies.

Place 1 tablespoon of butter in a large skillet and heat to high heat. Once the butter is melted, add the onions and garlic. Sauté for 1-2 minutes until just barely soft. Remove from the skillet and add 2 tablespoons of butter. Once the butter is melted, add the zucchini, summer squash, and black beans to the skillet. Sauté and stir for 2-3 minutes until golden, but just barely cooked through and still firm.

3. To serve, place a tortilla on a plate (you can double them up for extra stability) and load it with veggies. Top each taco with a generous sprinkling of Mexican cheese. Serve warm with fresh salsa. Homemade Salsa

The Great American Road Trip. Windows down singing along to the oldies as you wind through cornfields and over mountains. Some families make it an annual event, others

enjoy the Lampoon's vacation from the comfort of their living room instead. For you adventurous folks, you might want stop and think before you hop in the car and take off for your next trip. Vacations can be a lot of fun, but remember to be SMART about your travels and use these tips to stay safe on your Great American Road Trip: S – Stock up! Make sure you're fully equipped with everything you'll need for the long haul. First and foremost: an emergency kit. This should include items such as jumper cables, first aid kit and tools to change a tire.

In addition to emergency items, make sure you bring a car charger for your cell phones and other electronic devices. And, of course, make sure you have good tunes for the necessary road trip sing-alongs.

M-Map Your Route

You might have a general idea of what highways you plan on taking, but make sure you know the route and have detailed directions to guide you to avoid getting lost. Plan out where you're taking a break ahead of time so you know what is coming up and an approximate timeline of your traveling.

"Construction season" will likely be in full-swing by the time you're packed-up and headed out, so be aware of those delays and route your map to avoid them if possible. If unavoidable, make sure you break before heading in to those congested areas as delay times could get long.

A - Alert

Stay alert and actively pay attention to where you are and your surroundings. If something happens, you'll need to be able to tell roadside assistance or emergency responders where you're located, including what mile-markers you're between and where the nearest exit is. Knowing your surroundings is also helpful for safety reasons. If you need to make an unplanned stop or overnight stay, lodge at a more populated area or stop at a secure rest area to ensure you and your family are in a safe situation.

Another part of being alert is eliminating distractions. As the driver, focus on the road and driving safely while the passengers can take care of music, getting snacks out, double-checking the map and, most importantly, texting and/or calling. Lastly, make sure you check the weather forecast along your route as that plays a crucial part in the safety of your trip. According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, weather-related crashes account for 23% of all crashes each year totaling over 1 million. If you're driving in bad weather, don't use cruise control and leave plenty of space between yourself and the vehicles around you.

R-Re-charge

Keep an eye on your car to assure all levels are where they should be. Your gas tank should never dip lower than ¼ tank in the case of unforeseen accidents, traffic delays, car problems, etc. Know how many miles per gallon your vehicle gets and consider how many stops you'll have to make and when.

Most importantly, re-charge yourself. Driving drowsy is dangerous – like alcohol, it delays your reaction time, affects your awareness, impairs judgment and increases your risk of crashing. Always rotate drivers (if possible) to assure the driver can stay awake and alert the entire time – it's a good idea to pull over and sleep (or nap!) at a hotel if needed.

T – *Tune-up*

Before you even pull out of the driveway, there is preparation you can take to ensure safe driving. Your car is obviously one of the most important parts of the road trip so give it the attention it needs and deserves. A professional inspection and maintenance would check the car for all faults and ensure it is ready for the road.

After you're on the road, pay close attention to your car and check a few times through-



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out the trip that everything under the hood is still in good repair. When in doubt, don't hesitate to take your car to a mechanic to check and make repairs as needed. In addition to a tune-up, make sure your car insurance is ready to go too. Know your policy, what's covered and how to make a claim out-of-state. Don't forget to have important numbers, such as your insurance agent or roadside assistance, saved in your phone or written down for quick access if you need them.

Whether it's just one state over or you're traveling coast to coast, remember to be SMART about your road tripping this summer, and most importantly, have fun!

Follow the Interns ILLINI FS INTERNSHIP

CCFB has been following Illini FS/ GROWMARK interns, Avery Stoddard and Tanna Petersak, throughout the summer. According to Matt Hoose, Illini FS Crop Insurance Specialist/ Intern Supervisor, Avery and Tanna have been exposed to all aspects of Illini FS. Avery and Tanna have obtained hands on experience over the summer and will wrap up their 2015 internship on August 7.

Interns finish their summer work experience with a project presentation to the Growmark Board of Directors in Bloomington, IL. Avery and Tanna will each present on a topic of their choosing for 10-15 minutes, with a 5 minute question and answer session. Avery's project is focused on soybean planting, the issues that arise and how to fight problems. Tanna is presenting on a program called the "Pilot Program." The "Pilot Program" is a collaboration among Wal-Mart, Monsanto, and Growmark studying the fields of growers. The fertilizer, nitrogen, seeds, etc. are compared to inputs used in 1985. Findings through the "Pilot Program" include reduced chemical use and increased economic

and human health benefits. very and Tanna are spending time in the Illini FS area crop scouting. Current conditions are pretty good overall, but according to the interns they have seen some "disease pressure in corn. Primarily corn leaf blight and corn gray leaf spot in Champaign and Douglas Counties." Tanna says she "found Physoderma Brown Spot which is a minor disease in corn and not usually harmful to yields." Avery has "seen some damage from Japanese beetles in soybeans, but for the most part beans look good." The interns have also seen downy mildew, white mold, and septoria brown spot in soybeans. Avery and Tanna both encourage others to apply for the Growmark Internship program. They both said their experience has "been fantastic!"


Tanna says she "I definitely agree that the Growmark internship program is one of the top agriculture internship programs in the nation!" Avery said" I wasn't treated like an intern, I was treated like family. The Illini FS family was always ready to drop what they were doing and help me!"

Matt Hoose will miss the interns when their time is up, but will remain busy with yield checks, pollination reports and will still be looking for disease in soybeans. He also says he will spend time in Bloomington providing support to Avery and Tanna as they finish up their internship with their board of di-

rectors/project presentation! More about the internship program Growmark is in its 56th year of the internship program providing 57 interns from 18 different colleges with real world, agriculture experiences. The Growmark internship program is the oldest, continually run agriculture internship program in the Midwest. Interns will be exposed to all sides of agribusiness including agronomy, structures, nutrient management, facility planning, energy, marketing, commodities, IT and more. Interns participating in the 12 week, paid internship, work at a Cooperative, attend three meetings at Growmark's Corporate Office, and must complete a special project. The special project is an individualized project decided upon by the intern and supervisor. It is tailored to utilize the intern's skills, experience and special interests. At the completion of internship, the project is presented to Growmark's CEO, Board of Directors and other peers.

Interns are from the Northeast, Midwest, and Ontario, Canada. Interns must be attending a four year college, completing their junior year and entering their

senior year of college.




atre experiences every year." Lois and her husband Don have always loved to travel, making friends
